ASSAM: 18 ILLEGAL ROHINGYAS INCLUDING WOMEN & CHILDREN ARRESTED BY POLICE WHILE RETURNING TO BANGLADESH FROM HYDERABAD



Seven Rohingya illegally entered in Assam arrested by Assam police in Katigorah area of Cachar district. The group included women and children who were spotted by locals in the Lakichara area and captured. Eyewitnesses said that locals spotted suspicious movements of the group and enquired about their identity. But the group failed to give a specific

identity, and the police were informed by the people immediately. A team from the Gurma police station arrived on the spot and took the Rohingyas into custody. Cachar police sources said that the group was residing in Hyderabad for the last five years and worked as factory labour. They entered India in 2020 and obtained fake Indian Ids with the help of a

local taut. The arrested Rohingya group confessed that they fled from Hyderabad after seeing a recent crackdown by the government against intruders.

They were planning to return to Bangladesh via the Cachar border with the help of a taut.

Notably on 16th September also police arrested a group 11 Rohingya including women and children.

They were also working in Hyderabad and were planning to return to Bangladesh via the Cachar border. Unofficial sources said that the detained Rohingyas will be handed over to BSF to push them back to Bangladesh.

It should be mentioned that Assam CM Himanta Biswa Sarma recently said that over 3300 illegal infiltrators were deported from Assam so far.

JOINT FORCE RESCUES 66 FROM BEING TRAFFICKED FROM TEKNAF



A joint force rescued 66 people, including women and children, from a hideout in the remote hills of Teknaf last night (18 September) while they were being gathered for trafficking to Malaysia by sea.

Lt Commander Siam-ul-Haque, media officer of the Coast Guard headquarters, said the drive was carried out at Kachhapia hill area under Baharchhara union of Teknaf Upazila last night.

Among the rescued are 23 women, 22 men and 21 children, most of whom are Rohingya.

According to joint force officials, some of the rescued victims were abducted, while

others had been lured with promises of reaching Malaysia but were later held hostage by organised trafficking groups. Lt Commander Siam-ul-Haque said law enforcement learned that a group of people was being assembled for sea trafficking to Malaysia around 8:30pm yesterday. Later, a joint team of the Coast Guard and Navy launched an operation. Sensing their presence, 15 to 20 traffickers managed to flee. Several secret hideouts were then discovered on the hilltops.

"From these hideouts, 66 people were rescued. They said organised gangs in Teknaf are active in abduction and trafficking.

MYANMAR MILITARY SURGING TO CLEAR A PATH TO ELECTIONS

Beginning in July and escalating since, Myanmar's military has unleashed a wave of country-wide offensives, marking its most aggressive advances since the civil war intensified after a 2021 coup and signaling a new phase in an increasingly brutal conflict.

Pushing already fragmentated resistance forces onto the back foot, the flurry of punch-backs from a military that just a year ago faced serial defeat and humiliation at the hands of resistance forces has made significant headway along key trade routes to China in northeastern Shan state and to Thailand in eastern Karen state.

At the same time, as the military, or Tatmadaw, regains the battlefield initiative, it is also pushing south into Karenni state, where resistance forces potentially threaten the capital Naypyitaw, while effectively lifting the protracted siege of Bhamo city in northern Kachin state with riverine reinforcements and a rapid series of operations to reassert control over the rubble.
